Ryan Powell

Ryan was a High School All-American (1996) and a two-time member of the Central New York Empire State team (1995 and 1996). While at Syracuse, Ryan was named All-American four years in a row (1997-2000). In 2000, Ryan was named NCAA Attackman of the Year, NCAA Player of the Year and E-Lacrosse Player of Year. In his senior year at SU, Ryan recorded 96 points, tying his brother Casey's total scoring record at 287 points. Ryan is a present member of the NLL's Rochester Bandits and Major League Lacrosse's Rochester Rattlers. In 2001, Ryan led Major League Lacrosse in scoring and was named MLL's Most Valuable Player.

HISTORYOF

This marks the 30th anniversary of lacrosse in Texas. What started with former players in 1972, today involves over 3500 high school players in Texas. Lacrosse is one of the fastest growing sports in the state and across America.

There are over 31 women's teams and a budding 24 middle school programs. Colleges and universities across the state field both men's and women's lacrosse programs. Additionally, there are over 25 post-grad club lacrosse teams that play each spring in the southwest.

Lacrosse has always been a compelling sport. Those who have experienced its fast action and rugged play frequently form a lifetime attraction to the game. Modern lacrosse was introduced to the Lone Star State in 1971. Several prominent Houston citizens, among them Ralph O'Connor, Denton Cooley, Dr. DeBakey and Jack Bergland, sponsored the Naval Academy and John Hopkins to play their regular season NCAA game in the Astrodome for the benefit of the American Heart Association. Nearly 20,000 people attended. This was a NCAA lacrosse attendance record that stood for another decade. Out of this game came the contacts to start a Texas Lacrosse League. The following year, Russ Beers, Mike Harrington, Dr. lack Bergland and others joined Ralph O'Connor to round up enough former players to play an entire schedule. Houston won that first year's championship. Four teams started the league in 1972, Houston L.C., Dallas L.C., Univ. of Texas L.C., and Texas A&M L.C. Others followed quickly.

High school lacrosse was started in the Dallas-Fort Worth area in 1986. In 1987, St. Johns School started in Houston (coached by Matt Harder and Randy Bryan). In 1988, Houston grew to four teams; adding Kinkaid, Memorial and a W. Houston team, while D-FW stayed at two teams. At the end of the season, undefeated St. Johns traveled to challenge Dallas. St. Johns won the first unofficial State Championship. The High School League was organized statewide by Randy Bryan and has grown to its present status.

Jim Perryman and Bryan next teamed up to amend the club and college rules. This would allow a limited number of high school players to play with these clubs. From that, Perryman and Jerry Dickey formed a very active summer league to encourage students to learn the game. It continues today.

The early-day practical problems of getting equipment was solved by Jerry Dickey. For several years he peddled lacrosse sticks and equipment from his van as the formative teams practiced at schools and parks. Coaches for the high school teams—men's, women's and middle school— are largely volunteers. The first official State Championship Tournament was held in Houston with Houston's St. Johns, Lamar HS and Memorial HS, and Austin's Westlake HS. Lamar was in their first year and won the Championship in a close game over previously undefeated St. Johns. Since 1994, the progress of play at the high school level in Texas has been truly outstand-

ing. There have been ten men's high school All American Lacrosse players and three women's All Americans from Texas. One player from Texas was on the 1994 NCAA national college championship team. Several Texas players are currently playing in Division 1 college lacrosse. More student athletes from the Lone Star State can be expected to contribute to college lacrosse in the U.S.

Girls' high school lacrosse in Texas started when a St John's graduate, returning to Houston after playing lacrosse at Middlebury College in Vermont, introduced the sport at St. John's in 1990. So St. John's would have another team to play, Bellaire also started a club team that year. Three more years went by before Lamar, Episcopal and Kinkaid caught the lacrosse fever and started their own teams. In 1993, the first unofficial Texas Girls Lacrosse state championship was won by St. John's, a feat it has repeated four times since then.

In 1995, Ray Maitland, the THSLL Treasurer at the time, spotted a young woman wearing a Colorado State U lacrosse tshirt in a Dallas restaurant and persuaded her to start a girls lacrosse program in Plano. The Plano Lacrosse Club's earliest games had only 9-10 players who scrimmaged boys, a couple of college teams and anyone else who would play them. A year later, two more North Texas schools, Richardson and Coppell, which already had boys' lacrosse clubs, started girls' club lacrosse teams. A year after that two other schools, Greenhill and Loyola (in Shreveport, LA.) joined ranks.

A somewhat similar incident initiated girls lacrosse in Austin when a Bowie HS student visiting her sister at college in New York state saw her first game of girls' lacrosse. Returning to Texas, she contacted the lacrosse team at UT, and found a player who was willing to coach a team and girls high school lacrosse in Austin was off and running. A year later Austin High School provided Bowie with local competition when they organized a program.

Until 1999, Austin and Dallas lacrosse teams traveled to play each other as part of the Dallas District of the THSLL. But in 1999 three new girls' lacrosse clubs were started in Austin and two more in Dallas prompting the THSLL to divide the Dallas District into two separate Districts: Central and North.

National clinics are targeting Texas as one of their hottest new markets. Texas girls' teams are traveling to tournaments and clinics across the country, including a first-ever appearance at the US Lacrosse National Tournament.

With so many lacrosse players/coaches/enthusiasts relocating here from the eastern part of the U.S. and the fierce commitment that Texas programs are making to improve their mastery of the sport, the explosive growth of women's lacrosse in the Lone Star State is sure to continue.

LACROSSE

Through the tireless efforts of parents and coaches, young lacrosse enthusiasts are having more chances to play lacrosse than ever before.

Austin, Dallas and Houston all have well-established youth lacrosse leagues for boys. In each city, the story has been the same: parents of successful high school players have recognized the need for an earlier start and have created the youth leagues, which have been instant successes. Most of the youth programs focus on 6th through 8th graders, with a few starting in 4th grade.

The North Texas Youth Lacrosse Association (NTYLA) had its inaugural season in 1999 with sixteen teams and over 300 players. Austin now has two boys' youth leagues: the Austin Youth Lacrosse Association (AYLA) and the Westlake Youth Association. Between the two leagues, there are fourteen teams, plus three teams from San Antonio. The Central Texas area is home to over 300 young boys who regularly participate in youth lacrosse events. Houston Youth Lacrosse (HYLAX) was incorporated in 2000 and counts 70 players among its ranks, the majority being 5th and 6th graders, as well as some 7th and 8th graders.

The boys' leagues in Dallas, Austin and Houston have successfully held free clinics in the fall in order to attract new players. In fact, finding players has not been a problem. Finding coaches and referees has. Caren Zysk of AYLA says, "The coaching and ref shortage has impacted our growth. We desperately need to locate experienced people, as well as those willing to learn the game, to be officials and coaches."

One of the highlights for the boys' youth teams is the Texas Junior Jam, a sixteen-team festival held each April at St. John's School in Houston. Sam Chambers (St. John's) founded the tournament in 1995 and notes that many of the seniors seen playing in this year's THSLL state championship weekend "cut their teeth" at the inaugural Junior Jam.

The boys also have two elite youth teams—UI3 Team Texas and UI5 Team Texas. These teams have traveled during past summers to Champ Camp in Baltimore; the World Games in Baltimore; the Vail Shootout; and the US Lacrosse Youth Festival. As well as being fun and exciting lacrosse trips, the kids were also able to see various parts of the country and meet fellow lacrosse lovers.

The girls' youth lacrosse movement is underway, although not as advanced as the boys'. Currently only a few private schools in Austin, Dallas and Houston have 7th and 8th grade teams. However, all of the boys' youth leagues state that one of their main goals is to incorporate girls' programs into their leagues. During the past two years, there has been a record number of national lacrosse clinics for girls in the Lonestar state, with the majority of attendees being middle schoolers.

If you have a chance this weekend, watch one of the boys' middle school exhibition games or the girls' middle school all-star game. The future is bright for young lacrosse players. And no doubt there will be players on the fields this weekend who will be back to play in THSLL championships for years to come!

COACHES

Think Texas doesn't attract big-time coaches?

Think again.

Patty Parichy and Jess Marion represent a new kind of coach on the THSLL girls scene. Parichy, a three-time All-American from Maryland and former US Elite Lacrosse team member, arrived in Dallas last year and is now head girls' coach at Hockaday School.

Marion, an All-American and Brine/IWLCA Midfielder of the Year from James Madison University, coaches at Episcopal High School in Houston.

Their resumes are what most young lacrosse players dream of. And while Marion started lacrosse in the fourth grade, Parichy had a comparatively late start - first picking up a stick in the ninth grade.

In addition to the above honors Parichy was also a high school All-American at Radnor (PA) High; Captain of the Maryland Terrapins in '95; member of the NCAA D-I national championship team ('92) and two runner-up teams; and Defensive MVP of the NCAA D-I Tournament. She has been an assistant coach at both Maryland and Yale.

Marion grew up outside of Annapolis in Davidson, MD, where she attended South River High School. At James Madison, Marion made it to the NCAA D-I Final Four in 2000, the same year she was named to the NCAA D-I all-tournament team. She was CAA Player of the Year in 2000 and a member of the US Developmental Team from 1998-2000.

In short, these gals got game!

They recently took time from their busy schedules (coaching, teaching and each planning a wedding!) to answer some questions.


What was your most exciting lacrosse moment?

Marion: "There were so many great moments it's hard to pick one, but I would have to say beating UVA to go to the Final Four my senior year."

Parichy: "Winning the national championship in double overtime against Harvard. That was the most unselfish and supportive (on and off the field) team I've ever played with/for."

How many hours have you spent on "wall-ball"?

Both: "WAY too many to count!"

What advice would you give to a young player who wants to be a great player?

Parichy: "Play as much as possible - any chance you have to play, take it! Throw with a friend, against a wall, leagues, camps, clubs, school teams...PLAY!! Make sure, no matter what, that you remember why you are playing lacrosse...because you love the sport and it's tons of fun!"

Marion: "My advice would be to not limit yourself to a certain position on the field. Players need to understand both ends of the field and expose themselves to different aspects of the game. I would also emphasize the importance of playing hard while still having fun."

What do you think about girls' lacrosse in Texas?

Marion: "I am very impressed by how dedicated the coaches are to elevating the level of play and overall game of lacrosse in Texas. It's great that so many coaches provide so many avenues for the players to learn more about the game."

Parichy: "My impression is that girls' lacrosse in Texas is incredibly underrated. Having the comparison of the girls I was recruiting as a college coach only a short time ago and the girls I currently see in Texas, I can honestly say that the level of play is quickly catching up to the east coast.

Marion and Parichy represent a new kind of coach in the women's game in Texas. All of Texas benefits from their involvement in the sport. Both have helped bring top college coaches (and personal friends) to run lacrosse clinics in Houston, Austin and Dallas.

They both exude a "sky's the limit" spirit that is infectious to young players. And their message? "Play hard and have fun!"

COACHES'ES

Dave Vollmer

The growth of lacrosse in Texas is truly a grassroots effort, driven by the combined efforts of coaches and parents who love the game and see its contagious effect on the kids.

Lamar coach Dave Vollmer's job is not done when he leaves the lacrosse field. Like many of the coaches you will see over the course of the THSLL championship weekend, Vollmer puts in many hours of volunteer work to promote lacrosse.

Dave is a past commissioner and current secretary of the THSLL; he has coached the Lamar Redskins to THSLL championships in 1989 and 1995 and was runner-up in 2001; he has been a coach for the Vail Team Texas from 1997-2000. Perhaps most importantly, he has been around Texas lacrosse since the beginning and is always willing to lend an ear or offer advice. He has also been instrumental in helping girls' lacrosse get organized within the THSLL - it was under his reign as commissioner that girls were included in the league.

Dave recently reflected on the past, present and future of Texas high school lacrosse.

What is your experience playing lacrosse?

I started handling an old wooden stick in high school (Greenwich, CT). I played on my first team in college at Vanderbilt University (a second year club team) in the fall and spring of 1970-71. I then moved to Austin in 1976 and played with the San Antonio club team for two years, then played one year for the Austin 'Lone Star' club. I moved to Houston in 1979 and played for the original Houston club for seventeen years. I have played at Vail four times in the Open division (way back when) and in the old men's tournaments for the past thirteen years.

How did you get involved coaching lacrosse in Texas?


I started with the high schools in 1988. I used to run a men's club and college summer league in Houston with some club teammates. In 1987 and '88 a handful of high school kids started coming out to play. In '88 one of them said they were starting a team at Lamar and since I worked for the HISD and knew the Lamar principal, I offered my help. I went to a meeting in the fall of '88 with the Lamar principal and unexpectedly came out of that meeting a coach. (editors note: this is probably how most folks become coaches in Texas!)

What was Texas lacrosse like way back when?

First, let's talk about the clubs, because it is from the clubs that the THSLL got most of its early coaches...In the 70's the club leagues were a lot of fun. There were a lot of former college players that had moved to Texas or were passing through, either for work or military service. There were a lot of weekends of fun, competitive games and post-game parties. The 80's brought a lot of people to Texas and a lot of lacrosse players, too. The SWLA club league expanded and got really competitive when it went to a championship format. The number of players moving to Texas dwindled in the 90's and the number of high quality teams contracted. I think in the last couple of years the clubs have started another cycle of increasing numbers and quality.

High Schools...

When the high schools started boys' programs (1987-89) the lacrosse skills were really pretty weak, and the number of strong and



experienced players was small. Players would begin playing the game as juniors and seniors and were graduated by the time they developed any stick skills at all.

This situation improved quickly when boys who had begun playing as freshmen matured - by senior year you had a full team of guys that could use one hand well and some guys that had two hands. I would say the years between 1990 and 1996 saw a real cycle of improvement in the overall level of skills and playing ability with most teams. Plus the boys became more familiar with how the game is played. Increased skill and knowledge of the game produced a dramatic improvement of play on the field, which was demonstrated each year in the state tournament.

I think the proliferation of teams and camps and youth programs has led another dramatic improvement in the number of quality players and teams since about 1997 through today. Today the player skills, for both boys and girls, are at the highest level they have ever been. If teams want to be competitive they have to have skills with both hands as well as athletic ability and intelligence about the game. The past several years have been very competitive within the state and additionally a lot of teams have played in events out of state and shown very well against teams from other parts of the country.

What are the major changes you've seen in Texas lacrosse in recent years?

The major change is the sheer growth in the numbers of players and teams in the game, particularly at the middle school and youth levels. Young players are now getting to high school with good fundamentals and game experience. The best teams in Texas are as good as they have ever been, and that will continue as long as the numbers of good coaches can grow with the demand for them.

What has been your greatest challenge?

Continuing to improve my coaching skills. Trying to continue to compete at a high level with the other fine programs in Texas.

Where do you see Texas lacrosse in 10 years?

I hope to see the quality of the players and coaches continue to improve as it has over the last several years. I also hope to see more Texas high school players, both boys and girls, continue their playing careers in NCAA Division I, II and III programs. I hope to see the college club league in Texas continue to improve and compete at a national level. I hope to see more recognition of lacrosse in Texas as the truly great and exciting sport that it is.

SUMMARIES

Women's Central District Summary

Lacrosse in Austin continues its growth. The growth has brought its share of growing pains, including coaches, officials, and use of fields. Generally, we persevered and actually thrived throughout the year.

The District started the season with mostly new coaches. The unexpected loss of several coaches from last year projected a near panic situation at the first of the year, but new additions Laura Longoria at St. Andrew's (SAS), Gigi Teague at Westlake, Rita Garcia at Bowie, Robin Nelson at Austin, and Jackie Fansler at SMA came through with flying colors. Even with this turmoil, more and more girls' are playing better lacrosse.

Johanna Sanchez did a yeoman's job of getting a fragmented officiating crew up to speed to cover twice as many games than were played last year in the District. Saying we are out of the woods is premature, but our officiating woes of last year improved considerably.

The District started play this year with six varsity teams. St. Michael's Academy (SMA) became the newest varsity program. A new team at McNeil High School in Round Rock was formed and played this year as a JV team. Also notably, we added three new JV programs for a total of four. For the first time in the Central District, two Middle School girls' programs started and played this season.

The regular season play was dominated by St. Andrew's (9-I). The Crusaders nearly made it through the season undefeated, but a thrilling game with Westlake (8-2) turned into their only THSLL loss, I0-8. Austin and Bowie had identical records (5-4-I), with Austin winning the tie breaker for the third position. The Maroon and Bulldogs battled to one tie and Austin won the other game by one goal. St. Michael's Academy made their varsity debut by going 2 and 8 for the season. They were also competitive in a couple of other games. McCallum (0-I0) suffered through a long season, but were definitely showing signs of improvement toward the end of the spring.

The first round of playoffs pitted St. Andrew's against Bowie. Bowie got off to a strong start, but St. Andrew's had the lasting power and won 12-7. In the other game, Austin and Westlake battled back and forth the entire game, with Westlake finally holding on for a 9-8 overtime victory.

The finals brought the two strongest teams in the Central together on a warm night.

Westlake visited St. Andrew's for the Central District Women's Championship. It turned out to be a close fought

game with St. Andrew's prevailing 9-8. Both teams felt the record setting temperatures in the nineties at game time and played hard the entire game.

Next season again looks promising. There will be seven varsity teams and there are three strong possibilities for new startups. Additionally, at least one more JV team is expected and up to two Middle School programs. The ability to recruit coaches and officials will remain a critical part of this growth.

Women's North District Summary

We've come a long way since February 18 when long time rivals Plano and the Rams faced off for the first game of the 2002 season. Fifty-eight regular season and two playoff games later, the state championship games are all that remain.

Our season began shortly after the new year with the W.I.N. Lacrosse Clinic.

Six of the top women lacrosse players and coaches in the country came to Dallas to help our players hone their skills and learn new strategies for winning. In February, a number of N. District teams traveled to Texas A&M for the Aggieland Classic and to Shreveport, LA for the Laxin' on the Red Tournament.

This season we welcomed the return of Caddo Magnet HS of Shreveport to the N. District, upping our number of teams to ten. We also were encouraged by the startup of Trinity HS Girls Lacrosse. Trinity played the 2002 season as a JV team but with the experience and skill they gained this year, they'll be ready for a varsity schedule in 2003. Rumors persist that other Metroplex teams are in formation and we expect the number of teams in the N. District will continue to grow.

2002 was the first year the N. District had a real JV contingent. Six teams—Plano, Hockaday, Greenhill, ESD, Southlake and Trinity—played a full schedule of games, insuring a talented pool of players for next year's varsity teams to draw from.

ESD was the dominant team throughout the season, turning in an undefeated record in conference games. Neither second place Hockaday nor third place Greenhill could find a weak spot in their overpowering offense. In the District semifinal games, fourth place Plano appeared to have found a defensive strategy to slow down the Eagles. But in the end, their momentum was unstoppable and ESD prevailed 16-9. In the other District semifinal game, Greenhill, which just a week earlier had lost to Hockaday, reminded everyone it was no stranger to victory in playoff games, besting the Daisies 9-5.

SUMMARICES

Southlake, Byrd and Coppell tied for fifth place finish, followed by the Rams, Caddo Magnet and Loyola.

Six of our best players were selected as members of the team representing Texas at the US Lacrosse National Tournament Memorial Day weekend. And in July, the N. District will again send a team to the All Star Express in Annapolis, MD. For N. District lacrosse players, the season never ends!

Women's South District Summary

It has been another exciting year in the South District for the girls. Number I seed, CyFair was undefeated for much of the year and won all of the major tournaments in the area during the fall, winter and spring. Their streak ended when they faced #4 Memorial, who was the only team to defeat CyFair all year and they did it twice — once during the regular season and again during the semi-finals of the district playoffs. Just as last year, #3 Kinkaid improved with every game throughout the season and was at the top of their game heading into the tournament. They made it to the semi-finals, but were unable to overcome the experienced St Johns team. As expected, St John's had an outstanding year with the majority of their players returning from last year. They were seeded #2 in the district (only loss to CyFair) and defeated Memorial in the finals to win the South district championship.

Other teams in the area also had impressive play. Woodlands, Lamar, Kingwood and Episcopal rounded out the top 8 in the district. Each team had some shining moments, but not enough to launch them past the quarterfinals of the tournament. Other teams to keep an eye on include Clearlake, Klein and Bellaire. With the quality of lacrosse continuing to improve in the area, who knows what next year will look like?

Houston players were given the opportunity to participate in three different clinics this winter that featured coaches and World Cup players from around the country. Many players joined in the fun and they all left with some new skills to practice for the upcoming season.

Numerous players improved their speed, agility and stick skills over the season with the hopes of making one of several teams that will travel this summer. Several local players will help represent Texas in the National Tournament over Memorial Day weekend at Lehigh University. This tournament is a showcase of the best players from each US Lacrosse chapter from around the country. In addition, Houston will again send a team to the Vail Shootout in June/July and hope to continue to improve as they have over the last four years.

Finally, the Houston Heat travel team will begin its 3rd year featuring the best and up-and-coming players from the Houston area. Several trips are being planned for the summer, fall and winter to expose these players to various levels of play around the country.

The South District wishes best of luck to all of the teams in the State Tournament.

Men's North District Summary

For the second consecutive season Coach Hayward Lee's talented Episcopal School of Dallas' Eagles swept through the THSLL North District's Division I to lay claim to the regular season crown. Team speed, excellent stick skills and the scoring abilities of All-State trifecta, Chase Erickson, Mark Goode and James Clement set them apart from the rest of the division

Led by Butler University bound defensemen Carlos Navarro (All-American candidate) and Blake Skinner (All-State), the senior laden Eagles held their opponents to single digits throughout the season. During the regular season, no one really came close. One statistic sums up the situation. The margin of victory (in district) averaged over six goals per game.

Despite ESD's dominance, neither St. Mark's, Dallas Jesuit or Plano were in a "down cycle". As a group, this year's North District finalists are the best that Dallas has ever produced. An evenly divided total of eight players from these teams will matriculate to Division I & III college programs. Also, the Lions, Rangers and Wildcats faired well in outside district competition. St. Mark's won Division I of the Sante Fe Ironman Tournament and defeated Houston Episcopal, 16-8 in an early season match-up. Jesuit and Plano posted 4-2 records in the Sante Fe Tournament's Division II.

After the spring break tournament, second place finisher, Dallas Jesuit, turned up the pace. With only one All-State player, Coach Matt Oelker's Rangers punctuated their drive to the finals with two heart stopping, one goal victories over St. Mark's. All-District players Kevin Clontz (midfield), Collin Rankin (midfield) and Steven Gould (defense) exemplified a team with large numbers, athletic talent and the defensive grit to win close games.

The Rangers only had one, but what an All-State player! It may be argued that field magician, four year letter winner and future Ohio State player, Craig Nolan, may be the state's all time leading scorer. His total career points were: goals (204) and assists (103).

Coach Derek Thompson St. Mark's Lions can only think of

"what might have been". In their last two losses to Jesuit, they possessed the ball with less than a minute to go, but were unable to put it in the goal. The set backs don't diminish the quality play and character displayed over the last three years by the following All-State players: Brooks Baldwin (midfield), Brice Chaney (midfield), "the big left handed attack" Brian Pryor (Gettysburg) and John Wolcott (Academic All-American nominee, Duke).

In the final game of the regular season, Coach Bob Reich's Plano Wildcats displayed a glimpse of the future. The Wildcats pulled off a hard fought, overtime upset of Jesuit on the road. Playing with a nagging injury, Lehigh University bound, Clayton Schneider (All-State midfielder) and Joey Gentry (All-District, attack) sparked the offense. On defense, Zach Kurzweil (All-State, goalie) and Jacob Reich (All-District, defense) came up with the key defensive stops. The future looks bright for Plano, one half of their roster is freshman and sophomores.

The operative words in the North District's are growth and improvement. Numbers continue to grow dramatically in the Youth Programs. The overall level of skill in both Division I and Division II continues to improve. Look for Shreveport Captain Shreve, Trinity Euless and Logos Academy to join Division II next year. Division I should expand in two years.

Men's South District Summary

Men's Texas lacrosse changed the A and B divisional format to a true Division I and II status for the 2002 season. Teams for the DI are St. John's, Episcopal, Kinkaid, Lamar, Kingwood, The Woodlands and Bellaire (2001 DII champions who moved up after a great 2001 season). Teams for DII are Cy Fair, Memorial, Klein, Klein Oak, Klein Forest, Fort Bend, Houston West Side, Clear Lake, Strake Jesuit and new teams Stratford and Westchester Academy. Growth and competitive parity has been exceptionally good since the inception of the two divisional concepts.

Conference play got under way in March with close competition in both divisions with no one team gaining the upper hand in conference play until halfway through the season. In DI semifinal play, St. John's fought to a thrilling overtime win over Kinkaid and Episcopal beat a feisty Woodlands team. This set up the city DI championship which saw Episcopal prevail over St. John's 7-4. Strake Jesuit will represent Houston at the DII state championship in Austin.

Middle school lacrosse grew at a fast pace with three new teams: Cy Fair, Clear Lake and Westchester Academy. This

brings the total to ten teams in the Houston area. St. John's Junior Jam played an integral role in the middle school development. The future of lacrosse is in the middle school team developing talent for the high school programs.

This will be my final year as south district coordinator. I will miss being part of "the fastest game on two feet." The past ten years have been fantastic, from spectator to coach to coordinator to DII commissioner. Thanks to all of the people who helped and guided me in the right direction. See you all at the state championships!

Men's Central District Summary

The Central District boys decided to go to home and away scheduling for division I this season.

This allowed the 6 Division I teams to play each other twice. This format will make all of the central DI teams more competitive. The rapid growth of Lacrosse in Texas caused a referee shortage for us in the Central division this year and forced some non-league games to be canceled.

McNeil was in somewhat of a rebuilding mode this year. The team had graduated several seniors last year. The McNeil program is building into a stronger organization with their JV team playing a bigger schedule and the addition of a middle school feeder program. Central Catholic HS also graduated several seniors last year. Central showed some bright spots this year beating

Westlake in a great game. Central has been able to have their JV team take advantage of playing the new Division II schools in San Antonio. Westlake made the playoffs this year as the number 4 seed. The Westlake program is developing a huge feeder system with it's youth league and is expected to be a dominant force in Central for years to come. Westwood was the number 3 seed in the playoffs and played Austin in the semifinals. Westwood won the "Lax'n on the Red" tournament in Shreveport early in the season and carried that momentum through the rest of the season. All three of the starting attackmen are returning for Westwood next year. The two dominate teams in the DI Central this year were St. Mary's Hall and Austin HS. Austin is lead by senior goalie Matt Hicks who had a great season. Austin's only loses this year came to St. Mary's Hall. St. Mary's Hall showed once again that they are the best in the Central. SMH, who is lead by Junior Attackman John Stolmeier, is undefeated this year.

SMH is the SPC league champion and has clearly earned the number I seed in the state tournament.

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
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SUMMER

The summer heat does not hinder lacrosse zealots across Texas. From summer leagues to travel teams to camps, lacrosse players have plenty of choices during the long, hot months.

Dallas, Austin and Houston all have summer leagues for both men and women. These leagues generally meet one night a week and attract players of all ages - ranging from eager rising high school freshmen to college players and, on rare occasions, "old people."

Lacrosse trips are the name of the game for many elite players throughout the state.

Texas boys have played in the Vail Shootout since 1996, finishing third in '96, '98 and '99. The tournament gives them a chance to test their talents against some stiff East Coast competition. Although the team always strives to win, learning is what's most important. Earl Bill (St. Mary's Hall) has coached Team Texas in the past and says, "Going to Vail gave the THSLL men's lacrosse player a chance to see play from more advanced regions, such as Ohio, Baltimore and Upstate New York. Plus, we had a chance to see how we fared against states with similar years of experience, such as Utah, Washington and some parts of California. The Vail experience gives Texas players a gradient on what they need to do to play at the next level."

There are several off-season options for elite women players as well. This year will be the fifth year that Texas girls have competed at Vail; for the past several years two girls' teams have participated — one from Dallas and one from Houston. Last year saw the Houston team lose to a Connecticut All-Star team in the consolation championship game — a big accomplishment for a women's team from Texas.

Coach Scott Elmore (Memorial) was the head coach for the Houston team that traveled to Vail last summer. "I think we are getting to the point where we can play without looking like we don't belong," says Elmore of the team's improvement over the years. "The East Coast teams still have an advantage because they start playing at a younger age than most girls in Texas. Yet, when you look at it that way, what we are accomplishing is even more remarkable!"

Two years ago some Houston coaches started the first-ever girls' travel team - modeled after many of the East Coast travel teams they saw at Vail. The "Houston Heat" was born, with a goal to raise the level of play for elite players who truly love the game. The "Heat" has traveled to San Diego, where it beat defending state runner-up and future state-champion teams; and to Annapolis, MD, where it played in the "All-Star Express" - one of the top recruiting tournaments in the country. The "Heat" has also played some very competitive games with many of the Texas college club teams, including UT, A&M, Rice and TCU.

Coach Angie Kensinger (St. John's) says, "Last year almost every team in Houston had a player on the Heat. Through the Heat, these players are exposed to a whole new level of lacrosse. Not only do they improve, but they also take what they've learned and pass it on to their school teammates. Our goals are to allow these super players to become even better; to improve the level of play and sportsmanship in Houston; and to

let the rest of the country know that we have some pretty good players down here!"

2001 saw the first-ever girls' Texas team at the US Lacrosse National Championships, held in Bethlehem, Pennsylvania over Memorial Day Weekend. Tryouts were held and the team was selected according to US Lacrosse criteria, and a brave team of twenty endured two days of solid rain. Although the competition was tough, Head Coach Martha Brousseau (Kinkaid) felt it was a "positive and fun learning experience for the girls and also a good way to promote Texas lacrosse."

In 1989, the Texas High School Lacrosse League was founded with Randy Bryant as the first Commissioner of statewide scholastic lacrosse.

The determination was made during the next season to rotate the location of the Men's State Championship Event from Houston to Austin to Dallas, in order to help promote the development of new programs in these regions.

In 1996, the current four-team playoff format was initiated with three regional representatives and a fourth at-large or wild-card bid.

1998 was highlighted by the inauguration of the Women's Division of the Texas High School Lacrosse League and their first State Champion: The St. John's Rebels.
