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LITTLE BROTHER OF WAR The History of Lacrosse

The Great Game Lacrosse by Doug Hall

"Sticks" such as those at left were the principal weapons used in a semi-sacred ball sport variously known as "They Bump Hips" or the "Little Brother of War" that American Indians believe was given to them by the Creator sometime in ages past. This pair is part of the American Indian exhibit in the Smithsonian's Arts and Industries Building. They were made only a century or so ago by Tuscarora Iroquois craftsmen using hickory and rawhide, the wood for their curved heads steamed for hours, then bent around a crook-shaped block. More than three feet long and weighing a couple of pounds, they would seem unwieldy to modern lacrosse players, who pass the ball around and whack at each other with 12-ounce sticks of plastic, titanium and nylon. But they are symbols of triumph for a Native American culture that has otherwise been largely ignored, if not eradicated, by the modern white world. Year by year lacrosse grows more popular in North America (there are some 2,000 high school and more than 500 college teams in the United States alone) as well as in other parts of the globe from Japan to Germany and the Czech Republic. (When the Czechs first took up the game in the late 1970s, they reportedly used as a guide George Catlin's famous 1834 painting of Choctaws playing the game.) Yet lacrosse remains a uniquely Indian sport, requiring fierce competitiveness, speed and endurance, remarkable dexterity and tolerance of pain.

These days, of course, it is not lacrosse but

professional football--with hockey as a close second--that people might reasonably describe as the "Little Brother of War." As played today, men's lacrosse involves ten players per team and lasts 60 minutes in a space roughly the size of a football field. It is still a game of hard knocks and bruises, played with fast-paced, passionate zeal by men and women. A remarkable witness to the demands and fascinations of the game is football's legendary running back Jim Brown. "Lacrosse is my favorite game," says Brown. "It takes tremendous endurance and skill."

According to Rick Hill, Sr., a lacrosse stalwart and a professor of Native American studies at the State University of New York at Buffalo, little is known about the two Smithsonian sticks. But studies by Smithsonian researcher Thomas Vennum, Jr., author of American Indian Lacrosse: Little Brother of War (Smithsonian Press, 1994), suggest that in design lacrosse sticks are descendants of war clubs.

The butt of one elaborately carved stick at the University of Pennsylvania, crafted a century and a half ago, represents a hand holding a ball. Alongside it on the shaft is a carving of a handshake. The clasped hands, Vennum says, are not necessarily friendly. They may be symbolic of a dance in which warriors clasped hands to "strengthen themselves . . . as protective medicine" for battle. Some experts regard the carved ball in the hand as some kind of medicine ball, but Vennum thinks it is also linked to the ball end of war clubs, often carved as if held in the mouth of a snake or the claws of a bird of prey. The idea was that when such clubs were used in battle, the snake or hawk symbolically loosed its grip, sending the ball flying through the air to strike an enemy's head and kill him.

Sometimes the ball was carved as a human head that would fly off the club's handle and smack an enemy brave. One Iroquois legend tells of a flying head pursuing a whole family, bent on its annihilation. At the last second the ball is caught and thrown to its death in a vat of boiling bear grease.

As the game was played by its original inventors, from 30 to 50 players might take part on vast ball fields without sidelines whose variable length was determined by both teams prior to the match. Games lasted for days at times, and in some tribes players and nonplayers alike bet ponies, fortunes in fur and beadwork, even wives and children, on the outcome.

Early French and English settlers at first were both startled and horrified by the game. " Almost everything short of murder is allowable," one noted. "If one were not told beforehand that they were playing," another wrote, "one would certainly believe that they were fighting." Soon, however, they fell under the spell of the game, learning to watch (and place side bets) among themselves. So much so that lacrosse played a role during the period of Pontiac's Rebellion in which several Indian nations fought to reclaim lands from occupying British forces in what is now the Midwest. In 1763, during King George III's birthday celebration, Indians staged a game outside Fort Michilimackinac on Lake Michigan. While His Majesty's soldiers were caught up in the game's progress, warriors took the fort.

The later history of the "Little Brother of War" was sometimes as contentious as the relationship between Indians and Euro-Americans. According to U.S. Lacrosse, the Baltimore-based national governing body of the sport, white Canadians were playing as early as 1839. By 1856 in Montreal the first non-Indian team had been organized, and in 1860 a Canadian dentist, Dr. William George Beers, wrote the first Europeanized rules.

For a while lacrosse was promoted as the national game of Canada. Native American teams toured Europe playing exhibition games, including one for the benefit of Queen Victoria. Then, in 1880, the National Lacrosse Association of Canada banned

Indians from championship play--officially on the grounds that the Indians were paid "professionals" not eligible for "amateur" sports. By that time the game was catching on in North American prep schools and colleges, with a scattering of Indian varsity players at such schools as Dartmouth and (later) Syracuse.

Today in Indian communities all over North America at the first sign of spring youngsters sally forth carrying lacrosse sticks. Many Indian players still request to be buried with their sticks beside them. The tradition of carved wooden lacrosse sticks still

flourishes as well. In the Tuscarora Nation, near Sanborn, New York, Tuskewe Krafts, a firm owned by John Wesley Patterson, Jr., turns out 10,000 sticks a year at prices running from \$60 to \$90. For many Indians in ancient days, and today as well, a lacrosse game was a ceremonial replay of the Creation story, and of the struggle between good and evil that followed it. The game could also be worldly practical--mock war used for diplomatic purposes or as a prudent step back from the threat of war. The story, retold by Vennum, of two

lacrosse games played almost exactly 200 years ago between the Mohawk and the Seneca seems to offer a case in point.

Both belonged to the powerful league of Six Nations, the Iroquois confederacy that also included

> the Onondaga, Cayuga, Oneida and Tuscarora. The year was 1794. After the French and Indian Wars and the American Revolution. whites were again threatening Indian holdings in what is now Ohio and western New York. Chief Joseph Brant (Thayendanegea, in

Mohawk), a powerful chief who had sided with the British during the Revolution, was negotiating with them for land in Canada, but the site offered was unacceptable. The Seneca agreed: if they took it the Mohawk would be isolated from the rest of the Six Nations. When Seneca intervention resulted in a better site for the Mohawk. Brant set up a ceremonial lacrosse match in part. Vennum speculates, to celebrate the Seneca help.

There was also bad blood between Brant and Red Jacket, an influential Seneca chief, going back to a time when Brant had called him a "cow killer," because it was said Red Jacket sent Seneca warriors off to battle while he stayed at home butchering their cows for himself. The match may have represented a fence-mending effort on Brant's part. If so, it apparently hit a snag. During the game, according to a report written at the time and cited in a biography of Brant published in 1838, a Mohawk lost his temper and "struck a sharp blow" to his opponent with his stick. All action stopped, the story goes; the Seneca team walked off the field. The Mohawk and the Seneca did not play each other again until 1797. But they kept on playing, and so did the other Iroquois nations. Lacrosse, in fact, was one of the things that helped hold the Six Nations together through the difficult years that followed.

In 1990 the Iroquois Nationals, an all-Iroquois lacrosse team, traveled to Australia for the world championship under their own flag and carrying Iroquois passports. "We stood tall," says Rick Hill. "For a few moments the lacrosse-playing nations (England, Japan, Australia, the Czech Republic, the United States, Canada, Wales, Scotland, Sweden, Germany) saluted our national flag. It was quite a change after 200 years."


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LACROSSE IN TEXAS A Brief History

Lacrosse has always been a very compelling sport for those who have experienced its character and challenges. Many players' attraction to this unique amateur sport becomes a life-long commitment.

So it's common to hear tales of people who tried to introduce lacrosse in this part of the country as far back as the "thirties" and "forties" – perhaps even earlier.

But regrettably, many of these efforts to play, teach and promote lacrosse fell by the way-side. That was usually because there wasn't enough interest, support, access to equipment, or nearby competition to keep the game developing.

Modern lacrosse – the growth of which has been sustained to this day – was officially introduced to the Lone Star State in the year 1971.

The genesis of the sports evolution in Texas can be traced to a single, dynamic event; the now-legendary "John's Hopkins vs. Navy Game" – which was played in Houston's Astrodome during April of '71.

John's Hopkins University, one of the traditionally strongest lacrosse programs on the East Coast, had several alumni who had been drawn to the Bayou City's expansive boom of the "sixties". A former graduate, Ralph O'Conner (John's Hopkins '51) enlisted renowned heart surgeons, Dr. Denton Cooley, Dr. DeBakey, Dr. Jack Burgland, and Bob McMurrey, Jim Harrington, Dermot Riggs and several others to initiate this event. O'Conner approached the Eastern lacrosse establishment with his proposal to spark the development of lacrosse in the Southwest. Future Hall of Fame Coaches Bob Scott of Hopkins, and Navy's Willis Bilderback agreed to move their regular season NCAA game from the tide-lands of Maryland to the Gulf of Coast of Texas. The Navy Midshipmen downed John's Hopkins 9-6 in the event. It was to be the last game on the Naval Academy's schedule before their qualification for the inaugural NCAA Men's Division I Lacrosse Tournament – later that season.

Co-Sponsored by the Texas Heart Association, the Hopkins-Navy game attracted over 18,000 fans – an NCAA Lacrosse regular-season, single-game attendance record that stood until the late 1980's. Of course, only a token percentage of the parents and children who attended the charity event had any idea of what they were cheering about.

But a couple of fans did.

Two transplanted, former East-Coast players and enthusiasts were attending the Astrodome Game. After witnessing a small piece of lacrosse history, they made contact several days later. Bob Korba was an undergraduate student at SMU, while Dave Gruber was attending graduate school at Texas A&M. Within a few weeks. Korba's newly formed Dallas Lacrosse Club challenged Gruber and the students at Texas A&M to form a team and push for the creation of the sport in Texas. On a small section of the polo fields in College Station, a single crude goal was erected and lacrosse in Texas became a reality. After several scrimmages between Dallas and Texas A&M, the first full-field game was played in May of 1972 at the St. Marks School in Dallas. Later that summer, Texas A&M traveled South to play the newly formed Houston

Lacrosse Club.

In the late summer of '72, the Texas Lacrosse League was formed among these three new teams. A year later, in the fall of 1973, the University of Texas and San Antonio Lacrosse Club's were created.

The next season, Tulane University (established in 1972) joined the Texas League, and in December of '74 the organization was renamed the Southwest Lacrosse Association. Texas Tech, Baylor, and LSU expanded the league to nine teams the following year. The league was starting to develop a substantial momentum.

Over the next decade, the SWLA was sanctioning college and post-graduate club teams throughout Texas, Louisiana and Oklahoma. The cities of Houston, Dallas, and Austin were fielding multiple college and pot-graduate clubs.

1987 became another pivotal year for the growth of lacrosse in Texas. Founded by Randy Bryan (a former Houston Club player) and Coach Matt Harder (who played at the University of Texas from 1974-76) the St. John's School of Houston fielded the first scholastic team in the Lone Star State.

The following year, Houston's Kinkaid Scholl and Memorial High School initiated their own programs. By 1989, new high school teams were established in Austin (Westlake HS) and Dallas (Dallas Jesuit). The Texas High School Lacrosse League was established that year with Randy Bryan as the first Commissioner. The determination was made during the next season to rotate the location of the State Championship Event from Houston to Austin to Dallas. And former players – converted to coaches – were driving the expansion of scholastic lacrosse statewide. By the time the first seniors from these teams graduated to the ranks of Texas colleges, the quality of collegiate competition was showing remarkable improvement.

Men's high school programs had grown to nine teams by 1990, when women's scholastic lacrosse began its growth in Texas.

A St. John's graduate, who played women's collegiate lacrosse in Vermont, returned to Houston to introduce the sport to the young Rebel ladies of St. John's School. Bellaire High School also started a club team that year.

Actually, about fifteen years earlier in 1975, women's lacrosse was being played at the University of Texas. Many former out-of-state players were teaching their UT classmates the game. But their competition among the A&M and Baylor schools was limited, and their opponents did not have the experience or depth to keep their own

teams intact. So while the Longhorn women kept their club active for several more years, their competition failed to materialize.

The University of Texas women re-established the collegiate game in the early 90's and it finally caught on – at the same time women's high schools programs were beginning to expand.

By 1993, Houston had added teams at Kinkaid, Houston Episcopal and Lamar High School Their early development and long-tern growth amount other girls teams has continued to dominate their league's competition. During the mid-90's teams from Dallas – Plano, Richardson, Coppell and Greenhill – were established, as were Bowie and Austin High School's in the Austin area, and the Loyola School in Shreveport, Louisiana.

Today, Texas is one of the largest developing areas of lacrosse in the country.

And because the Lone Star State is so large, its potential growth exceeds nearly every other state playing lacrosse west of the Appalachians.

What was an East-Coast sport in the '40's and 50's, has now become a true national sport.

And the role of Texas in the future of lacrosse's nationwide growth, will continue to challenge, inspire and reward our athletes and supporter – of all ages.

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TEXAS HIGH SCHOOL LACROSSE LEAGUE



HISTORY

The Texas High School Lacrosse League (THSLL) (the "League"), though not named at the time, started with three high schools in Houston, Texas in 1987: Kinkaid, Memorial, and St. John's. The teams were started by three energetic student athletes from each school, all friends.

The first champion, St. John's, was crowned in 1988 in an unofficial tournament. Since that time, the sport of lacrosse in Texas has grown exponentially, fueled by other energetic young student athletes, coaches, administrators, and fans. It is fitting, that we are back in Houston for the 2011 THSLL State Championships. The first official THSLL champion was Lamar, crowned by Randy Bryant the THSLL Commissioner, in 1989, after a hard fought victory over St. John's.

OVERVIEW

The THSLL is over 77 Member School Programs strong in 2011, and is home to 143 Varsity and JV Teams and over 3,700 high school student athletes across the State of Texas. The THSLL provides the environment for a positive experience and motivation for success – in lacrosse, the classroom, and in life beyond high school; helping build self-esteem and confidence; teaching teamwork and discipline; promoting pride and belonging, and offering an excellent avenue for exercise, competition, and recreation.



CENTRAL DIVISION I RECAP

TThe 2011 season was one of parity across the Central District DI with final tournament seedings not decided until the last games of the season.

The Central also performed well in competition with other Districts getting wins against opponents in the North and South and playing some great games in the Super Regionals. Austin High continued their reign as District Champions winning for the 5th time in 6 seasons.

The Austin High Maroons, led by Coach Andy Garrigan, won the Central District Championship with an 8-1 District record. The season's only loss came

Austin was led by a strong senior class with many All-State and All District players. Westwood, led by new head Coach Jamie Booth, had their best season in several years. Highlights of the season included several close losses with out of district opponents and a 16-3 win over Kincaid in the Super Regional before a close 7-3 loss to St. Mark's. Returning so many players, Westlake is a leading contender for 2012.

Another bright spot in the Central was first year DI team Alamo Heights. They are led by Head Coach Dave Monnich and Assistant Coach Chip Flanagan who was part of the St. Mary's Hall dynasty in the late 90's and early 2000's. The team finished at 4-5 in District play but boasted the most athletic team in the Central. Watch for good things from this strong San Antonio program in the future.

Teams finishing out of the playoff mix were Bowie, led by first year Head Coach Justin Becker, Saint Mary's Hall Barons, led by Coach Mark Richards, Cedar Park, led by Coach Chris Knight, the St. Stephen's Spartans led by new Head Coach Noah Fink, and the St. Andrew's Crusaders led by Coach Jamie DeBole.

The Central District continues to grow in numbers and youth programs continue to strengthen the talent pool across the district. Increased strength of teams will enable more parity of play between the Central and other Districts in the years ahead.



SOUTH DIVISION I RECAP

South District Division I saw many teams moving up and down in comparison with their 2010 records. The Woodlands squad was one of the teams moving up this year by going undefeated. achieving a (14-0) overall record, a (10-0) district record and winning the 2011 South District Division I Championship. Having last won the district championship in 2008, the Highlanders earned the #1 seed out of the going into the THSLL Super Regional's. In district play, Coach Dave Seale's team rolled through Kingwood (7-6), St. John's (11-3) Episcopal Houston (11-6), Houston Christian (11-9), St. Thomas (23-0), Memorial (20-3), Kinkaid (15-5), Lamar (10-0), Cinco Ranch (18-0) and Strake Jesuit (13-6). The Woodlands also picked up victories in out of district play defeating Highland Park (8-5) and Westlake (8-3).

As one would expect with such a successful season, The Woodlands earned four All-State and four All-District post season honors. Leading the way for the Woodlands was All-State middle. District MVP and All-American nominee Chase Rogers, All-State attackman and All-American nominee lan Seale, All-State defenseman Nick Huckins and All-State middie Allan Good. Earning All-District Honors was attackman Spencer Willey, midfielder Connor Milton, goalie Shane Casey, long stick

middie Nick Sivon and Max McKinnion at face off. The Woodlands look to be strong next year with Ian Seale, Spencer Willey and Connor Milton all returning for their senior year.

Chris Arnold made an impression in his first year as head coach of the Kingwood Mustangs going 8-2 in district play, a significant improvement from last years 5-4 record. Kingwood narrowly lost on the road at The Woodlands (6-7) and Episcopal Houston (13-14). Kingwood finished the season as the #2 seed out of the South, earning a first round bye in the THSLL Super Regional's. Earning All-State honors for Kingwood for 2011 was defenseman and All-American nominee Hunter Hendrick, goalie Patrick McClernon, also an All-American nominee, and attackman Ryan Delange. Defenseman Matt Foster earned All-District honors for the Mustangs. With 25 seniors on the 2011 squad, 2012 is shaping up to be a rebuilding year. However, with an undefeated JV squad, Kingwood hopes to rely on their incoming talent to continue their 2011 success.

The South District Division I added yet another team from the Division II ranks by welcoming Houston Christian, making it to the THSLL Super Regional's in there first year. It was quite a debut for the Mustangs, going 8-2 in district, losing only to Kingwood (10-7) and The Woodlands (11-7). The South's District's normal three round playoff schedule had to be abbreviated this year to the Easter weekend in late April and TAKS testing. Placing third in the district, Houston Christian faced #6 St. John's in a playoff game for the right to advance to super regionals. Tied 7-7, Houston

> Christian scored with 8 seconds left, but still had to fend off a literal last second goal attempt by St. John's to win 8-7. Midfielder Steven Hartshorn and Long Stick Middie lles Mitchel achieved All-State honors. All District attackmen Brooks Lehle and Bucky Desadier both will return for 2012 to help the Mustangs.

After going 7-3 in district play, Kinkaid strong showing towards the end of the season was

capped with a (7-4) victory over Episcopal Houston in the district playoffs and earning

the fourth and final spot from the south for the THSLL super regional's. Kinkaid's season included some close games, including victories over Lamer (9-6), St. John's (8-6) as well as big victories over Strake Jesuit (13-7) and their district game with Episcopal Houston (10-3). Kinkaid ended their season however on a disappointing note, losing to Westlake in the super regional's 13-6. At All-State for Coach Jeremy Platt's team is junior defensemen Henry Waite and senior Graham Bayley at faceoff.

Last years South District DI champion Episcopal Houston Knights dropped off this year with a 6-4 record. With a notable victory over Kingwood (14-13) but with disappointing losses to rivals St. John's (2-10) and Kinkaid (3-10), Episcopal gained the #5 spot in the district but lost to Kinkaid (4-7) in district playoffs. Returning for his senior year for 2012 is All-State and All American candidate Max Skibber. Sophomore Defensemen Steve Pitt won All District Honors along with All-District junior midfielder Max Hudson.

St. John's team this year was bitten with the injury bug and finished their district record at 5-5. The Maverick's season was highlighted with wins over Episcopal Houston (10-2) and Strake Jesuit (10-4). Getting somewhat healthier towards the end of the season, St. John's lost to Houston Christian in the final seconds of the District playoff (7-8). For next season, Coach Sam Chambers is hoping to rely on some rising juniors to get back to contention. Junior defensemen Jack Craddock and senior midfielder Will Wallace won All District honors for St. John's.

After narrowly missing the State Championships in 2010, The Strake Jesuit Crusaders suffered a disappointed 2011 season going 6-12 overall and 4-6 in District. Strake's typical late season surge never materialized and failed to make the playoffs this year. They did however achieve victories over St. Thomas (17-0), Cinco Ranch (14-1), Lamar (10-2) and Memorial (9-5). Senior midfielder lan Margot earned Honorable Mention for post season honors.

Memorial, Lamar, and Cinco Ranch all struggled this season with 3-7, 2-8 and 2-8 district records respectively. New comer St. Thomas had a particularly difficult year 0-10 district record. For his heroic efforts in goal, Lamar's Joe Loden achieved Honorable Mention post season honors from the South coaches.

For 2012, the South District anticipates the addition of Clear Lake to Division I, solidify the growth of the sport in Division 1 in the south.

Due to the huge growth of lacrosse in Houston, programs at the youth, middle school and high school level need parents of today's player to be active and volunteer their time to improve the quality of the game in Texas for future players.
